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

Always Learning More

Dog-Safe Gardening

Garden organically, for the sake of both the planet and your dogs.

Raised beds protect plantings from scampering paws and swinging tails.

Digging pits, preferably in shaded locations, give dogs places to practice their excavation skills without disrupting your garden beds.

Leave a plant-fee "patrolling" area around the perimeter of your yard; dogs instinctively (and repeatedly) cruise boundaries and fence lines.

Construct a barrier around plants of the nightshade family, including eggplant, tomato and potato; their foliage and stems contain dangerous alkaloids that can kill a dog.

Avoid cocoa bean mulches; their chocolaty smell makes them pup catnip, but they contain theobromine, which is toxic for dogs.

Cross almond or walnut trees off your list for areas used by dogs; tannin is a canine toxin, and almond and walnut hulls contain it; moldy walnuts are also a problem.

Do not use snail bait containing metaldehyde, which is highly poisonous to dogs and cats. Copper barrier tape is a good alternative; slugs and snails are deterred from crossing it by the tape's tiny positive electric charge.


Dogs love grass—eating it, rolling in it, playing on it and, unfortunately, "fertilizing" it, too. Urine can cause a nitrogen overload on most grasses, and females, because their squatting produces a steady, concentrated stream, are more likely to create the brown ring pattern on lawns, which some horticulturists call "female dog spot disease."

So if you're planting or replanting a lawn, choose your grass type with that in mind. Fescue and perennial ryegrass have been found to be the most urine tolerant, while bluegrass and bermudagrass seem to be the most sensitive. Better still, consider a lawn substitute like white clover or O'Connor's strawberry clover, both of which are easy to maintain. Another plus: they require less water and, being nitrogen-fixing themselves, require less (if any) fertilization.

More to Watch Out For (Who Knew?)

- Uncooked yeast dough, which can actually rise in a dog's stomach, resulting in blockages, among other things.
- Macadamia nuts are toxic to

dogs-best to keep them all to yourself.




Fun Canine Facts

Superior Sense of SMELL:

A dog's nose is a wondrous instrument: When a dog sniffs a scent article, air

rushes through the nasal cavity and chemical vapors-or odorslodge in the mucus and bombard the dog's scent receptors. Chemical signals are then sent to the olfactory bulb, the part of the brain and an "odor image" of Murray, Utah.

Tops in the Class ...

- A dog's sense of smell has been tested at 10,000 to 100,000 times stronger than a human's, an order of magnitude equivalent to one second in 317 centuries!
- Human noses have about 6 million sensory receptor sites; Beagle noses have more than 300 million.
- · A dog can detect a teaspoon of sugar diluted in a million gallons of water, or as much water as it takes to fill two Olympic-sized pools.
- A dog can detect a human scent on a glass slide that has been lightly fingerprinted and left outside for two weeks.

What's in a Nose?

Dogs have a vomeronasal organ (VNO) located in the roof of the mouth, and used to detect pheromones (vital to maternal care and sexual behavior). Dogs work the VNO by flicking their tongue in and out, almost as if

A dog's nose is normally cool and moist, but a warm, dry nose does not necessarily mean a dog has a fever. While many older dogs will lose some vision and hearing, the sense of smell normally stays with them for a lifetime.

In hot weather, when a dog pants heavily, the ability to get a clear picture of smells is reduced.

Noses have a pattern of ridges and dimples that, along with the outline of nostril openings, make up a nose print as individual as a human's fingerprints.




